- Stonesfield Primary School is part of the West Oxfordshire School Sport Partnership (WOSSP)
- WOSSP has eight secondary schools and each secondary school heads a partnership. Stonesfield is part of the Woodstock Partnership, headed by Marlborough School, with eight other satellite primary schools such as, Bladon and William Fletcher.
- Sue Cork is the School Sports Co-ordinator for the Woodstock Partnership. Part of her role involves organising sporting events and competition for pupils as well as offering support, advice and networking opportunities for PE Co-ordinators and their schools.
- Each primary school has a PE Co-ordinator which, in Stonesfield Primary school, is currently Miss Jenkins.

Physical Literacy Framework

- High quality physical education: delivered by Teachers, PE Specialists and Coaches (a minimum of two hours per week)
- Extra-curricular school sport: equipping every child to lead an active, healthy lifestyle through opportunities to attend after-school sporting clubs in school - and links within the wider community- and clubs such as, Cool Club (by invitation only)
- Competitive school sport: providing opportunities for children to compete within school (intra-school) and with other schools (inter-school)
- Non-competitive sport and physical activity: providing opportunities such as, dance workshops

Competitive Sport in Stonesfield School

- Intra- School Competition(level 1): In 2014-2015, this has included events such as, Sports day and a KS2 Kwik Cricket tournament
- Inter-Schools Competition (level 2): In 2014-15 the school competed in 16 out of the 18 Partnership sporting events
- Culmination of inter-school competition (level3): In 2014-2015, pupils at Stonesfield Primary School won events in Cross-Country , Football and Swimming and qualified to compete at County level

Sainsbury's Kitemark Award



Stonesfield Primary School has been awarded the Bronze Kitemark 2014-2015

- The Sainsbury's School Games Kitemark is a Government led awards scheme launched in 2012 to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and into the community

PE Premium

- £8,000 pa plus an additional £5 per pupil (calculated on pupil role in January and made in 2 instalments)
- David Cameron has made a commitment until 2020
- Schools must spend the funding to improve the quality of the PE and sport activities they offer their pupils, but they are free to choose the best way of using the money.
- hire specialist PE teachers/sports coaches to work with teachers
- provide existing staff with teaching resources to help them teach PE and sport
- support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs, holiday clubs and change4life clubs
- run sport competitions or increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- run sports activities with other schools.
